

Head Start and Early Head Start in Idaho



Leading the Way

Funded by the federal government, Head Start and Early Head Start have the overall goal of increasing the school readiness and social competence of young children in low income families, understanding that children develop best in the context of their family and culture. Parents are respected as their child's first and most important teacher and caregiver.

Total Enrollment: 5,154

Many children and families are involved for more than one year: 25% of children were enrolled in 2nd Head Start year; 9% of children were enrolled for 3 or more years

Head Start (aged 3-5) 3,629 or 70%

Head Start is a comprehensive child and family-focused preschool program designed to help low-income and at-risk 3 and 4-year-old children and their families succeed in school and life.

Early Head Start (aged 0-3) 1,535 or 30% Pregnant moms: 114 Early Head Start serves pregnant women, infants and toddlers and expands the reach of Head Start's continuous, intensive and comprehensive child development and early learning program until the child turns 3 and is ready to transition to Head Start or another pre-K program.

Home Visiting

Home visiting is an integral part of both Early Head Start and Head Start. Home visiting has been shown to be an effecive way to support families and children because it reaches families where they live and tailors services to meet individual needs. Most of Idaho's Early Head Start programs are home-based and include weekly home visits and twice monthly group socializations. Head Start includes home visits at least twice yearly.

School Readiness

Head Start is the nation's most successful school readiness program. School readiness means children are ready for school, families are ready to support their children's learning, and schools are ready for the children who enter their doors. School readiness for children in Head Start and Early Head Start is measured by the skills set out in these five learning domains: Approaches to Learning, Social and Emotional Development, Language and Literacy, Cognition (Math and Scientific Reasoning), and Physical Development and Health. School readiness outcomes are assessed in the Fall, Winter and Spring of each year.

Each Child is Unique and Important


The entire range of Head Start and Early Head Start services are responsive to each child and family's developmental, ethnic, cultural and linguistic heritage and experience. Head Start and Early Head Start are dedicated to serving children with disabilities – Special services are available to ensure that children can fully participate in all aspects of the program. Each Head Start program must work with their local school districts so there is a seamless move into the school system to ensure the child's optimal development.

14% of Head Start and Early Head Start children had a disability and an IEP/IFSP. These were primarily speech/language impairment & developmental delays.

Comprehensive and Two-Generation Services

Head Start and Early Head Start support parents in their role as primary caregivers and first, most important teachers of their children. Programs build relationships with families that support positive parent child relationships, family well-being and connections to peers and community. We offer family members opportunities for growth, and offer guidance as they seek to meet personal goals and achieve self-sufficiency. Parent involvement is encouraged both in the classroom and in decision making through local parent-run policy councils.

This two-generation approach supports stability and long-term success for the families who are most at risk. Depending on each family's needs, they receive a wide range of individualized services. **Over 86% of families received one or more family support services.**



Thanks to Head Start and Early Head Start's comprehensive services, by the end of the school year children have received health and nutrition services, appropriate well child medical and dental screenings, mental health services, and needed referrals for diagnosed health conditions.

Head Start/Early Head Start Return on Investment

Children that participate in Head Start programs receive innumerable benefits. These advantages appear immediately, last a lifetime, and even have an effect on other generations. The effects are particularly strong amongst certain subgroups of children, particularly Hispanic and African-American children, dual language learners, children who are homeless or in foster care, those who qualify for free lunch, and those whose mothers didn't graduate high school. When disadvantaged children receive high-quality birth-to-five education, such as Early Head Start plus Head Start, the return on investment can be as high as 13% annually.

Children in Poverty and Access to Head Start and Early Head Start



In 2016-2017, there were 23,666 children in poverty under age five in Idaho (21.1% of all 0-5's). Of these, only 4,001 or 17% had access to Head Start and Early Head Start. 11% of Head Start and Early Start children were Homeless.
